

# Where are we now and how we got here


- Revised AR 30-22 authenticated by OAASA on 31 March 2005 (Major revision)

- Effective date 10 May 2005

- Most important changes:

- Inclusion of IMA (*now IMCOM*)

- Redistribution of responsibilities

# Some things AR 30-22/DA Pam 30-22 say

## Tactical Food Advisors have a role in Garrison operations

- Advise commander having operational control of dining facility operations on food service matters (*AR 30-22, para 3-12 b & c*)
- Quarterly action plans (*AR 30-22 para 3-13/DA Pam 30-22 para 3-8*)
  - Administration
  - Subsistence
  - Sanitation
  - Food Safety (DA 5161)
  - Personnel
  - Equipment
  - Facilities
  - Resource management



# Some things AR 30-22/DA Pam 30-22 say

## Tactical Food Advisors have a role in Garrison operations

- **Operational Reviews** (*DA Pam 30-22 Appendix C*)
  - High Dollar Subsistence (monthly)
  - Requisitioning and Receiving (semi-annually)
  - Physical Security (semi-annually)
- **Inventory Management** (*DA Pam 30-22 para 3-20*)
  - Compare actual inventory levels to authorized amounts (*AR 30-22 para 3-24*)
  - Assist FOS in developing corrective action



# Some things AR 30-22/DA Pam 30-22 say

## Tactical Food Advisors have a role in Garrison operations

- Account status review (*DA Pam 30-22 para 3-46*)
  - Monthly review of account status (+3/-10%)
  - Assist the FOS in developing remedial action plan
- Approve local box lunch menus (in-house ingredients) (*DA Pam 30-22 para 3-56*)



# Some things AR 30-22/DA Pam 30-22 say

## Tactical Food Advisors have a role in Garrison operations

- Food service equipment actions (*DA Pam 30-22 para 3-63*)
  - Notify FPM on equipment replacement requirements
  - Ensure requisition paperwork is completed and submitted
  - Ensure follow on training is conducted and documented
- Ensure Army mend standards are addressed for all meals planned in MTOE dining facilities operating under ARCS (*DA Pam 30-22, para 3-70b*)
- Review of Ration Control Sheets (*AR 30-22 para 3-37b*)

**History.** This publication is a major revision.

**Summary.** This regulation covers the garrison feeding, field feeding, and subsistence supply operations of the Army-appropriated fund food program.

**Applicability.** This regulation applies to the Active Army, the Army National Guard/Army National Guard of the United States, and the U.S. Army Reserve. During mobilization, the proponent may modify chapters and policies contained in this regulation. This regulation is not applicable to cadet mess dining facilities at U.S.

military academies; academies are governed by Department of Defense Regulation 7000.14-R, volume 12, chapter 20.

**Proponent and exception authority.**

The proponent of this regulation is the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-4. The proponent has the authority to approve exceptions or waivers to this regulation that are consistent with controlling law and regulations. The proponent may delegate this approval authority, in writing, to a division chief within the proponent agency or a direct reporting unit or field operating agency of the proponent agency in the grade of colonel or the civilian equivalent.

Activities may request a waiver to this regulation by providing justification that includes a full analysis of the expected benefits and must include formal review by the activity's senior legal officer. All waiver requests will be endorsed by the commander or senior leader of the requesting activity and forwarded through their higher headquarters to the policy proponent. Refer to Army Regulation 25-30 for specific guidance.

**Army management control process.**

This regulation contains management control provisions in accordance with Army Regulation 11-2 but does not identify key management controls that must be evaluated.

**Supplementation.** Supplementation of

this regulation and establishment of command and local forms are prohibited without the prior approval of the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-4, ATTN: DALO-SMT, 500 Army Pentagon, Washington, DC 20310-0500.

**Suggested improvements.**

**History.** This publication is a major revision.

**Summary.** Operating procedures for the Army Food Program have been completely rewritten and consolidated into one pamphlet encompassing garrison, field, and subsistence support. Policies that guide these procedures have been separated and are incorporated in Army Regulation 30-22. This pamphlet establishes procedures for implementing a la carte dining facilities and for watercraft facilities that provide subsistence when underway or in dock. Additionally, the pamphlet provides procedures for using catered meals and host nation meals. The consolidated pamphlet gives procedures

for operating under the subsistence prime vendor program and includes guidance for the implementation of the U.S. Department of Agriculture Food Recovery Program.

**Applicability.** This pamphlet applies to all Active Army, Army National Guard of the United States (ARNGUS), and U.S. Army Reserve (USAR) units performing a food service mission in the absence of an automated information management system. During mobilization, the proponent may modify chapters and procedures contained in this pamphlet. The procedures in this pamphlet are not applicable to cadet mess dining facilities at United States Military Academies. Academies are governed by DOD 7000.14-R, volume 12, chapter 20.

**Proponent and exception authority.** The proponent of this pamphlet is the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-4. The proponent has the authority to approve exceptions or waivers to this pamphlet that are consistent with controlling law and regulations. The proponent may delegate this approval authority, in writing, to a division chief within the proponent agency or its direct reporting unit or field operating agency, in the grade of colonel or the civilian equivalent. Activities may request a waiver to this regulation by providing justification that includes a full analysis of

the expected benefits and must include formal review by the activity's senior legal officer. All waiver requests will be endorsed by the commander or senior leader of the requesting activity and forwarded through their higher headquarters to the policy proponent. Refer to AR 25-30 for specific guidance.

## Some things AR 30-22/DA Pam 30-22 WILL say

- Incorporate revised AR 735-5 guidance
  - ROS becomes Financial Liability Investigation
  - Thresholds remain (\$500 and \$4000)
- Directed Meals and Lodging (aka MTSS) guidance for institutional training
- TISA to become Subsistence Supply Management Office
- Increase cash allowed on hand in DFAC to \$1500



## Some things AR 30-22/DA Pay 30-22 WILL say

- Expanded common service reimbursement:
  - RCs of other services
- Clarification of terms as they relate to the Army Food Program:
  - Installation Commander
  - Garrison Commander
  - Senior Mission Commander
- Clarification of FPM office location and reporting



## Some things AR 30-22/DA Pay 30-22 WILL say

- Updated HCP guidance (when MPA funded)
  - Not authorized in UBL
  - Not for CONUS or short term training
  - Not for developed theater (AAFES Support)



## Some things AR 30-22/DA Pam 30-22 DO NOT say

- You can never have over 6 days of inventory

### 3-24. Inventory management

*a. Inventory criteria.* Dining facility inventory levels will be maintained using the following criteria:

(1) The total dollar value of the monthly inventory (perishable and semiperishable) will not exceed the total dollar value of dining facility earnings for a 6-day average period. The dollar value of earnings will be determined by using the previous months average daily earnings multiplied by six. If the dining facility was closed for an extended period, use the average daily earnings for last month that the facility was open.

(2) The FPM will authorize in writing all adjustments to the inventory level policy.



## Some things AR 30-22/DA Pam 30-22 DO NOT say

- You cannot operate DFACs at <65% utilization rate

### 3-8. Utilization review

Installation commanders will conduct a utilization review of all installation dining facilities annually. Utilization rates are calculated by using the formula contained in DA Pam 30-22, paragraph 3-5.

*a.* Installation commanders must consider consolidating dining facilities when total utilization of any facility drops below 65 percent of the design capacity on an annual basis.

*b.* Installation commanders must also consider alternative arrangements, such as opening additional dining facilities or limiting participation of cash customers, when the utilization rate exceeds design capacity by 10 percent.



## Some things AR 30-22/DA Pam 30-22 DO NOT say

- Account status does not matter

### 3-15. Installation food service financial management

*a.* The FPM will conduct a midyear review in the month of April to determine the financial status of all dining facilities on the installation (see DA Pam 30-22, para 3-21). The FPM will analyze all overspent dining facility accounts. For any account that is overspent, the FPM will assist the FOS in developing a plan to ensure that facility ends the FY (FY) at zero or underspent.

*b.* At the conclusion of the FY, the FPM will determine the installation food program financial status (the comparison of all underspent DF accounts to all overspent accounts). The installation food program financial status policies are located in paragraph 3-12*a*(5). When the installation food program financial status does not end the FY at zero or underspent, relief from loss will be accomplished for each overspent dining facility per paragraph 3-16.

*Speaking of account status...*

- Army menu standards include pre-made entrees and desserts
